### International Dinner set

The annual International Dinner for foreign students, friendship families and other interested persons will be held at 6 p.m. Saturday in the cafeteria of South Eugene High School on East 19th Ave.

There will be a short program as well as presentation of awards to foreign students for outstanding achievement and major contributions to international understanding.

Each family is asked to bring a casserole or main dish sufficient to serve 12 persons, and a salad or dessert.

### Writing awards available

The Department of English has announced the availability of three awards for creative writing. Students should submit manuscripts for consideration to the English office, 118 PLC by 5 p.m., May 17. The awards are:

The Julia Burgess Award of \$25 which is given annually for the best original poem or poems submitted by an undergraduate student. Any type of poetry may be submitted, but if the poems are short, they should be turned in as a group composed of not more than five or less than three.

The Alicia Wood Poetry Award of \$15 for the most outstanding poem submitted by an undergraduate student. Entries for this competition must be in traditional verse form.

Note: Manuscripts for these two poetry competitions should be typewritten, double-spaced, and submitted in triplicate. The name of the author should not appear on the manuscript but should be attached in a separate, sealed envelope with the title of the poem.

H.E. Neuberger Award, \$50, for the best

manuscript to appear in Creative Writing courses, entrance restricted to students currently registered. Fiction, drama, and poetry manuscripts, one to five poems, one to two stories, one or two dramas, one novella or novel or a substantial representations of sections thereof should be submitted. A student may submit up to the maximum specified in one or more genre.
