### Evonuk named

Eugene Evonuk, director of the Center of Research for Human Performance has been appointed a committee member of the Applied Physiology Study Section for the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Public Health Service, National Institutes of Health and the Division of Research Grants.

Evonuk, whose term will run from July 1, 1971, through June, 1975, is a professor in the school of Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

As a member of the Study Section, he will help provide advice on matters relating to medical research in the U.S. to the several national advisory councils and committees of the National Institutes of Health.

The study section on physiology is responsible for reviewing applications for research grants in that field, and for surveying the status of physiological research.

### Artists featured

Three Northwest artists are featured in an exhibit that opens at the University Museum of Art on Tuesday, November 24 and continues through December 20.

Thirty watercolors by Perry Acker, Seattle artist, will be on display. Acker teaches art in Seattle and has exhibited his work in many of the major U.S. art museums.

Dorothy DeYoung, who is associated with the Rogue Gallery in Medford, will exhibit 21 sand castings or sculptures and Jane Gehring, associate

professor of art at the University, will display a number of Java batiks from her collection.

The Focus Gallery on the third floor of the museum will offer a showing of jewelry by Hannah Goldrich and pottery by Lotte Streisinger, both local artists.

Most of the items on exhibit will be for sale.

Museum hours are 12 noon until 5 p.m. daily except Monday.

### History applications

The Department of History at the University is taking applications for about 30 graduate assistantships available during the 1971-72 academic year.

Two categories of graduate awards are offered by the department: graduate assistant readers with stipends of \$2,300 for the year and graduate assistant teachers with stipends of \$2,900 for the year. An M.A. degree is a prerequisite for the teaching assistantship awards.

Applications for fellowships under the National Defense Education Act (NDEA) may also be made to the department. These fellowships provide stipends of \$2,000, increasing to \$2,200 and \$2,400 with allowances for dependents, and are renewable for three years.

All graduate assistants register at reduced fees of \$38 per term. Application forms and further information may be obtained through the department. Applications must be submitted by February 1, 1971.

### Planning Committee meets Wednesday

A special meeting of the Campus Planning Committee will be held at 3 p.m. Wednesday in 101 EMU.

Christopher Alexander, newly appointed campus planning consultant, will be present.

Some current activities of the planning committee include approval of the controversial EMU addition, which has stirred protest in the form of a petition drive. Opponents of the proposed annex feel that it will detract from the open area in the Carson quadrangle. Restoration of the millrace and the use of 13th Avenue between Kincaid and University Streets were also recent projects of the Campus Planning Committee.

### Court panel approves pre-trial agreements

A new policy requiring pre-trial agreements between defense and prosecution in an effort to expedite hearings under the University's Code of Conduct was passed by the Senior Court Panel yesterday.

The Senior Court Panel, an

administrative organization which came into being last spring to establish procedures for Student Courts met jointly with the University Appeals Board.

Panel members are appointed on the basis of their knowledge of the student court system and serve as chairmen of Student Courts.

The decision to use pre-trial agreements came after discussion of what the panel considered to be excessive time consumption and audience disruption of the "Weyerhaeuser" trial last week.

Pre-trial agreements will be restricted to a joint statement by defense council and prosecution as to facts agreed upon, facts disputed, points of law agreed upon, points of law disputed, and a statement of charges.
