Jobs needed by students

Jobs, almost any kind, are needed by University students, who are finding the cost of living exceeds the cash in hand. Almost any kind of part-time employment is acceptable, according to Mavis Jones, head of the student employment office. Her office, she said, is constantly crowded with students looking for anything from yard work to clerical employment. Wage rates for particular jobs, as quoted by Mrs. Jones, are: baby-sitting, 75 cents to \$1.00 per hour; housework, \$1.50 to \$2.00 per hour; odd jobs, \$1.60 to \$1.65 per hour; yard work, \$1.50 to \$2.25 per hour; and clerical or secretarial work, \$1.60 and up.

Journalism society to host meeting today

The professional journalistic society, Sigma Delta Chi, will host an informational meeting today at 4 p.m. in the Allen Hall reading room. Speakers include two members of the National Board of Directors: Frank Wetzel, Portland Bureau Chief of the Associated Press, and Gary Stewart of KVAL-TV in Eugene.
